

# How Much Rice?

## Materials Needed

Measuring cup, teaspoon  
measure, 3 ½ cups of dry rice,  
tray with sides or large shallow  
baking pan, a large and small  
bowl to put rice in.

## Prepare in Advance

Pour the dry rice into the large  
bowl.

1. A warm-up activity that compares the number who responded to Gideon's call to fight Midian (32000) with the number the Lord chose to fight (300).
2. How many grains of rice do you think will fit into one cup? (Types of rice vary in size. For this experiment, we've chosen 9,600 as the number of grains in a cup. Let students guess and see who comes close to a reasonable answer!)
3. (For older children) If each cup holds 9,600 grains, how many cups of rice would be needed for 32,000 grains? ( $3\frac{1}{3}$  cups)
4. Invite the children to measure out  $3\frac{1}{3}$  cups into a large flat tray or box lid. Engage the senses by allowing children to touch the rice and experience what 32,000 feels like.
5. Now we need to measure 300 grains of rice. For this we only need 1 teaspoon. Invite the children to measure the rice a teaspoon of rice. Pour the rice into a small bowl. How does 300 grains of rice feel?
6. Compare the large and small amounts of rice. Ask age-appropriate questions, e.g., Which container has more rice, which has less? Which amount would feed many people? How much more rice does the tray have than the small bowl? (a ratio of 3:320 grains)
7. Today we will hear a story that includes the numbers 32,000 and 300. Let's find out what the story is about.
