

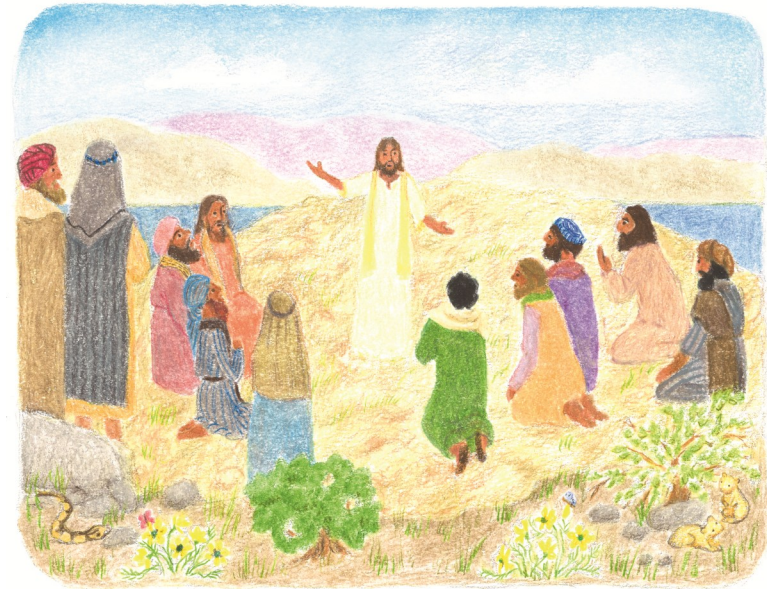

48. Sending Out the Twelve

- a) Note that some of the eleven disciples doubted a bit, even though they worshiped Him. Of course, it must have seemed impossible, since they had seen Him crucified, that He was fully alive—more than fully alive. He could appear in rooms where the doors were locked!
- b) Emphasize to children that the Lord said He had all power in heaven and on earth. He was, and is now, our God, our Maker, and our Savior. Only God has all power in heaven and on earth.
- c) Tell children that the disciples were very brave after this, teaching people bravely, even though the leaders hated them for it, and later the Romans hated them. They were simple people, some of them couldn't read, but they were so very brave. They remembered that the Lord would always be with them, watching over them from heaven, because He said so.
