1 Samuel 16

Teacher Background

After Saul disobeyed the Lord, the Lord told Samuel to look for a new king of Israel. He sent Samuel to Bethlehem to the house of Jesse where he would offer a sacrifice. Samuel invited Jesse and his sons to the feast. Jesse called seven of his sons to walk before Samuel, but Samuel said none of them were to be the next king. Then Jesse called David, his youngest son, and David was chosen. So Samuel anointed him king. Although only a boy, David was called to court to play the harp and soothe Saul's troubled spirit. Saul quickly came to love David and asked David's father if he could come and stay at court.

David, Israel's second king, represents the Lord as Divine Truth, unlike Saul, who represents truth that is applied according to outward appearances. The anointing of David represents a new state of spiritual understanding of truth that comes into power in our thinking. It is an understanding that deals with thought and motive and is not misled by appearances. When this truth rules in our lives we can recognize our weaknesses and our need of the Lord's guidance.

Focus Points

- Samuel was sent to Bethlehem to anoint one of Jesse's sons as the next king of Israel.
- After rejecting the older sons Samuel called David in from the field and anointed him.
- The spirit of the Lord departed from Saul and as he was tormented David was brought to play the harp and soothe his spirit.

Readings from the Writings

"Divine Truth itself is at the root of the Lord's being called 'the King'. The reason why kings were anointed and consequently called the anointed was that 'the oil' with which they were anointed meant good. Also the truth, meant by 'king', was derived from good and was accordingly truth grounded in good, so that the kingly office with them represented the Lord as regards Divine Truth which is derived from Divine Good, and so represented the Divine marriage of good within truth, whereas the priestly function represented the Divine marriage of truth within good." *Arcana Coelestia* 3009

"David ... represents the Lord's kingship or Divine Truth." Arcana Coelestia 4594

"Because the harp used to correspond to confession of the Lord, and evil spirits do not endure that [confession], therefore David by means of a harp drove an evil spirit away from Saul. *Apocalypse Revealed* 276

Additional Project and Activity Choices

Looking at the Heart

It is not unusual to judge strangers by what they are wearing, their size or their looks. Samuel did this when he saw the eldest of Jesse's sons. Eliab looked like a king, so Samuel thought that he would be the Lord's chosen. Encourage students to notice when they are judging someone by their appearance. For example, a tall person must be a good basketball player, or beautiful people are nice. Encourage them to resist such thoughts and try to appreciate the person's qualities more than the way they look.

The Lord Visits Samuel Again

Saul disobeyed the Lord, and Samuel never went to see him again. Samuel was very sad. After a while, the Lord came to him and told him to stop being sad. He had an important mission for him. He was sending Samuel to find the next king of Israel! The Lord said,

"Fill your horn with oil, and go; I am sending you to Jesse the Bethlehemite. For I have provided myself a king among his sons." (1 Samuel 16:1)


Samuel Goes to Bethlehem

The Lord told him exactly what to do. He was to go the house of Jesse in the town of Bethlehem. He would take a heifer with him and announce that he was coming to sacrifice to the Lord. You may recognize the name Bethlehem from the Christmas story. The Lord was born there. The shepherds were watching their sheep in the fields around Bethlehem when the angel appeared to them. Bethlehem was called "the city of David."

Samuel was to invite Jesse and his sons to the sacrifice. Then the Lord would show Samuel which son He had chosen.

"I will show you what you shall do; you shall anoint for Me the one I name to you." (1

The Lord knows that the way a person is on the outside does not show what he or she is like on the inside. Have you ever bitten



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into an apple that looks delicious and discovered it is rotten? You cannot know for sure if an apple is good just by the way it looks. In the same way, you can't know if a person is good on the inside by looking at them. But the Lord sees into a person's mind and heart. He knows what a person is thinking and feeling. That is why He could tell which son would be the best to rule Israel.

David Is Chosen and Anointed

Jesse called seven of his sons to walk in front of Samuel. After each one passed by, Samuel said to Jesse,


"The Lord has not chosen these." (1 Samuel 16:10)

How could this be? Samuel asked if he had he seen all the sons of Jesse, and he replied,

"There remains yet the youngest, and there he is, keeping the sheep." (1 Samuel 16:11)

Everybody waited while Jesse sent for David to come in from the fields. Jesse's youngest son was bright-eyed and good-looking. As he walked into the feast the Lord said,

"Arise, anoint him; for this is the one!" (1 Samuel 16:12)



Jesse and his sons must have been astounded! The youngest son had been chosen to be the next king of Israel.

So Samuel anointed David with oil from his horn.

The oil that Samuel poured on David's head was a sign that he would be king. The oil was a symbol of the love that the king should have for his people. Only someone who loves and follows the Lord can be a truly good king.

David Goes to Saul's Court


Even though David had been anointed, he was still a boy and would not be king for many years. The Lord needed to prepare him to be a king. David spent much of this preparation time at King Saul's court, where

he would have the chance to learn a great deal about the duties he would have when he became king.

How did this simple shepherd come to live at the king's court? The Word tells us that after David was anointed that "the spirit of the Lord departed from Saul" (1 Samuel 16:14). Remember, Saul did not know that Samuel had anointed another king. Saul started to feel sad and got upset easily. He was troubled by evil spirits.

Saul Comes to Love David

Saul's servants thought that perhaps hearing lovely music on the harp would calm his troubled spirit. One of the servants knew someone who was skillful at playing the harp. He was a strong and courageous young man. So Saul sent messengers to Jesse asking him to send his son David to his house. And so, David came to live at the royal court.



Whenever Saul was troubled, David played soothing music for him on the harp. Then Saul would feel better and his sad feelings would go away.

Saul quickly came to love David, whose beautiful music could calm his troubled spirit. The songs he sang were often Psalms. Many of them are in the book of the Word called Psalms. Saul also made David his armorbearer. He sent a message to David's father.

"Please let David stand before me, for he has found favor in my sight." (1 Samuel 16:22)

A psalm is a song of praise or thanks. David wrote more than a hundred songs like this. He was "the sweet psalmist of Israel." The words for these psalms really came from the Lord to be included in the Word as Divine Revelation. David explained,

"The Spirit of the Lord spoke by me, and His word was on my tongue." (Psalm 23:2)

The Lord's words can help you too when you have angry, sad, or selfish feelings. You will learn to hear the Lord's words more and more if you read His Word and speak to Him in prayer.
