Saul Hates David and David Flees

1 Samuel 18:1-6; 19:1-18

Teacher Background

After David killed Goliath Saul brought him into his household and made him a captain over his army. Saul's son Jonathan felt an instant connection with David and they became friends. They made a covenant and promised to protect each other. Jonathan gave David his armor and weapons. But Saul was soon jealous of David's popularity and began to hate him. Despite Saul's attempts to kill him, David behaved wisely. When Saul ordered Jonathan to kill David, Jonathan warned David of the danger he was in. David escaped to his own house. His wife Michal helped him escape through a window. Saul chased David but the Lord protected him.

David and Jonathan's friendship is a rare kind of selfless love that desires the joy of another person above one's own joy. Jonathan's act of giving his weapons and armor to David symbol-izes him giving David the right to become king after Saul. Saul's jealousy of David illustrates the opposite of his son's love. Even the joy Saul felt while David played the harp for him was a selfish love, based on what David could do for him. When David gained popularity Saul was unable to feel happy for his success, but plotted his death.

Focus Points

"Jonathan stripped off the cloak that was upon him and gave it to David, and his garments, and even his sword and his bow and even to his girdle." A Wonderful Friendship

After killing Goliath, David took Goliath's head to Saul, and Saul asked him who he was. This may seem strange since David had been in Saul's court for a while and had often played the harp for him when he was distressed. However, Saul did not seem to know David. When David answered, Saul's son Jonathan heard and instantly felt connected to David.

"And it was so, when he had finished speaking to Saul, that the soul of Jonathan was knit to


the soul of David, and Jonathan loved him as his own soul." (1 Samuel 18:1)

After David's battle with Goliath, Saul was very pleased with him and kept him at court. He did not allow David to return home and made him a captain over the soldiers. David went to battle wherever Saul sent him, and was a successful military leader.

During this time, David and Jonathan became close friends. They made a covenant with each other, a promise to help and protect each other. Jonathan even gave David a gift of his clothing, his armor, and his sword and bow. This friendship continued throughout Jonathan's life.



David had done a wonderful deed for Saul. He had saved Saul's army from the powerful Philistines. For a while it seemed as if Saul was grateful to David



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for saving the Israelites. But something happened to change Saul's feelings, and make him very jealous of David.

As Saul and his soldiers returned home from a battle against the Philistines, the women came out singing and dancing to meet them. Saul heard the women singing:


"Saul has slain his thousands, and David his ten thousands." (1 Samuel 18:7)

From that day on Saul looked at David suspiciously. His love soon turned to hatred. He was afraid that David would take the kingdom from him. How much Saul had changed from being the humble person he had been when he was first anointed king!

Saul Tries to Kill David

David behaved wisely in spite of Saul's hatred. He was a good man who helped the Israelites. However, Saul grew angry over David's popularity. In fact, he became so jealous of David's good qualities that he wanted to destroy him and tried to kill him several times.

Once when Saul sent David to fight the Philistines, he promised that David could marry his daughter Michal if he won the battle. What Saul was really hoping was that David would be killed. But David was wise and brave, and returned safely.



Then Saul ordered Jonathan and all his servants to kill David. But Jonathan warned his friend David about the danger he was in! David hid in a secret place while Jonathan persuaded his father to treat David well because he had done many great things for Saul and his kingdom. Saul let David go home. But as David played the harp to comfort Saul's troubled spirit, Saul turned on him and threw a spear that pinned him to the wall. David escaped and ran to his house.

Saul Follows After David

So Saul sent messengers to David's house to watch him. He planned to kill David in the morning. But David's wife, Michal, helped him to escape by letting him down through a window.

Then she tricked the soldiers into think-


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ing David was sick in bed. She dressed up an small statue, an idol, and put it in his bed. She covered its head with a goat's hair blanket, so it looked as if David was sleeping. At first the soldiers believed her. This gave David time to run away to Ramah where the prophet Samuel lived.

Even though David escaped, Saul did not give up. He sent messengers to capture David three times, but each time something amazing happened.

As the messengers searched for David they came close to where he was hiding with Samuel. They saw Samuel leading many prophets in prophesying.

"And when they saw the group of prophets prophesying, and Samuel standing as leader over them, the Spirit of God came upon the messengers of Saul, and they also prophesied." (1 Samuel 19:20)



Saul decided to go himself, and the same thing happened to him! In fact he was so filled with the spirit of God that people even wondered if Saul was a prophet too.

You might wonder if Saul will leave David alone now after seeing how the Lord is protecting him. But Saul could not forget his anger and continued to hunt for David.

Jealousy

You may sometimes feel angry towards others like Saul did. Your feelings might make you say or do something that is unkind. Perhaps you felt that you deserved the praise that someone else received so you said something mean. Jealous words can harm another person's feelings and reputation, but they will also harm you.

We can often keep jealous feelings to ourselves, but they can still lead us not to like someone. This makes it hard for us to be happy if they are happy. If you feel this way, try to be like Jonathan, who loved David for his wonderful abilities. He could have been jealous, but he was not, and he even gave David gifts to cheer him up.

Next time you feel jealous, ask the Lord for strength to be happy about the special attention or favors someone else is getting. Then the Lord can take away the jealous feelings and help you feel joy instead.
