Amnon and Tamar

2 Samuel 13:23-39

Teacher Background

David had several wives and therefore some of his children were half-siblings. One of his sons, Amnon, became attracted to his half-sister Tamar and began to lust for her. Amnon's shrewd cousin Jonadab suggested a way that he could see Tamar alone so he could take advantage of her, which he did. Tamar begged him to take her as his wife but Amnon rejected her. She left weeping. King David was furious but did nothing. Tamar went to live with her brother Absalom. Two years later Absalom took revenge. He got Amnon drunk and killed him during a sheep shearing festival. David mistakenly heard all his sons were dead, but Jonadab told him the truth. Absalom ran away, and for three years David longed for him.

This story illustrates the disorder of adultery. David ignored Amnon's evil act, and in doing so demonstrated his own falling away from the Lord. He ignored his responsibilities as a parent, and as a ruler. When Absalom took the law into his own hands David overlooked his behavior and longed to have him back by his side.

Focus Points

- Amnon deceived his half-sister Tamar and assaulted her but David did nothing.
- Absalom took Tamar in, plotted his revenge against Amnon, and killed him.
- Absalom fled and David mourned for three years but did nothing.

Amnon and Tamar

2 Samuel 13:23-39

Vocabulary

deceitful—dishonest

committed—did something

disorder—something that does not obey to the Lord’s laws of order

David broke the Lord’s commandments and suffered for disobeying the Lord. In this story we learn about the trouble that David’s disobedience brought him and his large family.

David’s Family

In those days kings had many wives. Therefore David had many wives and many children, but they did not all have the same mother. Many of them were half-brothers or half-sisters.

This story is about Amnon, and his half-sister Tamar. Amnon was the son of David’s second wife, Ahinoam. Tamar was the daughter of David and Maacah. As David’s first-born son, Amnon would be king after his father.



Amnon’s Shameful Deed

Amnon should have protected his beautiful half-sister, Tamar. But all he wanted to do was use her selfishly. He knew that the law of Moses strictly forbade this. But he could only think of what he wanted. He wanted it so much that it made him sick.

“Amnon was so distressed over his sister Tamar that he became sick; for she was a virgin. And it was improper for Amnon to do anything to her.” (2 Samuel 13:2)

Amnon’s friend, Jonadab, thought up a plan to help Amnon get what he wanted. Jonadab was crafty, but Amnon agreed to his deceitful plan. Amnon pretended he was ill. When his father came to see him he asked David to send Tamar to prepare special food for him. So David asked Tamar to go to her brother’s house. She

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baked little cakes of dough, but when she took them to Amnon he refused to eat. He sent his servants away, and told Tamar to bring the cakes into his bedroom to feed him. Then he did something very evil. He abused his half-sister, and ignored her when she begged him not to do such a wicked thing.

Amnon Sends Tamar Away

Amnon may have said that he loved Tamar. He may have even thought that he did. But once he got what he wanted, he hated her. Then Amnon committed another evil and broke the law of Israel by refusing to marry her. He cruelly sent Tamar away, telling his servants to put her out of the house and bolt the door behind her.

Tamar cried bitterly all the way home. She tore her robe of many colors and put ashes on her head to show her terrible grief. At first, the people who learned about Amnon's wickedness did nothing to bring him to justice. Tamar's brother, Absalom, told her:

“Hold your peace, my sister. He is your brother; do not take this thing to heart.” (2 Samuel 13:20)

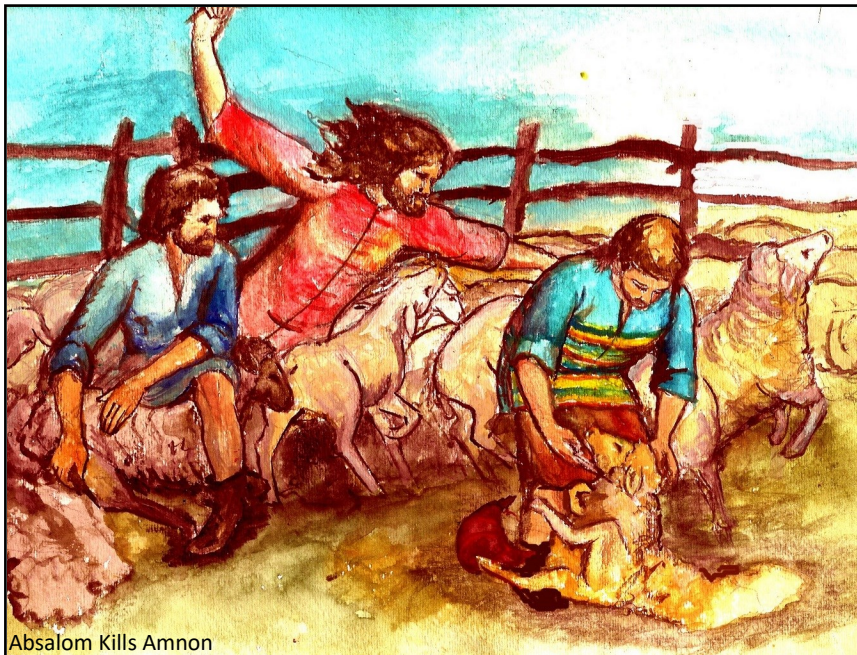
However, Absalom hated Amnon for what he had done. He also wanted to be king instead of his older brother, so he plotted a terrible revenge.

King David also heard what Amnon had done and although he was very angry he apparently did nothing. So Tamar went to live in Absalom's house.

Absalom Seeks Revenge

Two years later, Absalom thought of a way to get revenge. Some men were coming to shear his sheep. This was a special event so he invited David and his servants to come and celebrate with him. David refused his invitation, but gave Absalom permission to invite Amnon and all the king's sons. This gave Absalom the perfect opportunity to have Amnon killed.

Absalom commanded his servants, “When I say to you, ‘Strike Amnon!’, then



Absalom Kills Amnon

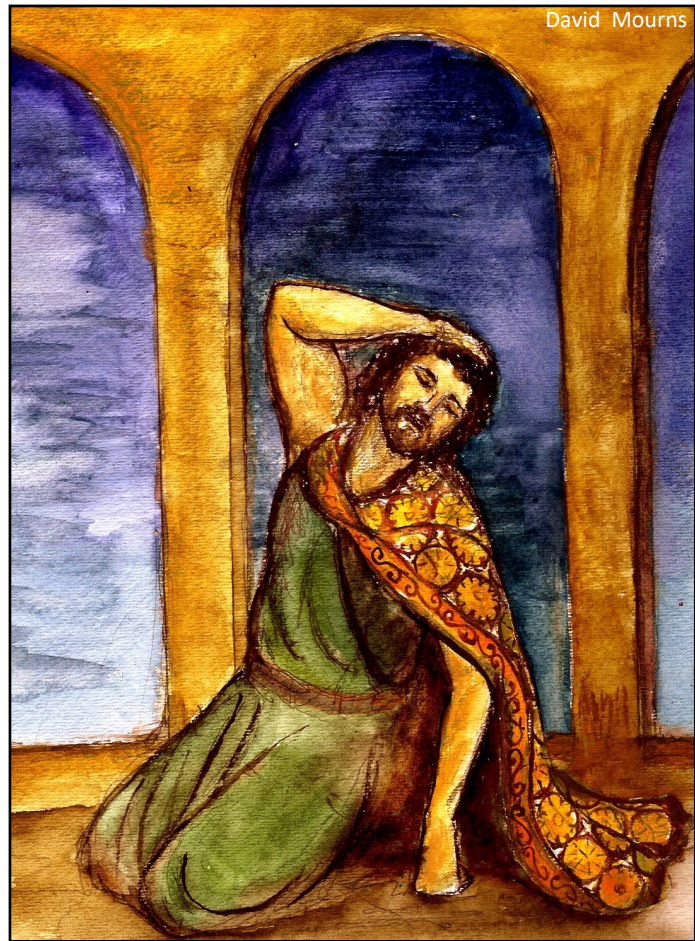
kill him. Do not be afraid. Have I not commanded you? Be courageous and valiant.” (2 Samuel 13:28)

Does this seem courageous? Amnon had done was evil, but he could have been punished in other ways. As Tamar’s father, David should have made sure Amnon was punished according to the law.

Absalom Flees

When David heard that Amnon had died he mistakenly thought that all of his sons had been killed. He was devastated and tore his clothes. Then Jonadab, told David that Absalom had only ordered Amnon to be killed. When David was united with his sons they all wept.

Absalom thought that David would punish him and ran away. But after three years David began to long to see his son. Again, his feelings were more important to him than making sure justice was done.



Obedience to the Lord’s Laws

The Lord’s Word tells us about terrible things so that we can learn to stay away from these evils. The actions of some of the people in this lesson illustrate that choosing to do what you want to do instead of doing what is right, can create great sadness and disorder.

In this story we heard how Amnon abused his sister, Tamar. This deeply hurt and saddened Tamar. We also learned how Absalom took the law into his own hands and had Amnon killed. In both cases David did do what the law required, but did what he wanted to. People who do this make it impossible for the Lord to bring them true love and happiness.

A Gift From the Lord

The Lord wants to give everyone love and happiness. He has provided for a special love between husbands and wives called conjugal love or marriage love. This gentle love protects and cares for the happiness of another person. The Lord promises everyone this kind of love, but He can not just give it to us. We have to work for it by avoiding thinking, saying or doing things that might hurt marriage. This is the life of religion, and religion and married love go hand in hand.
