Parts:

Narrator Jonathan Saul David little lad

Narrator:

Then David fled from Naioth in Ramah, and went and spoke with Jonathan.

David:

"What have I done? What is my iniquity, and what is my sin before your father, that he seeks my life?"

Jonathan:

"By no means! You shall not die! Indeed, my father will do nothing either great or small without first telling me. And why should my father hide this thing from me? It is not so!"

David (taking an oath again):

"Your father certainly knows that I have found favor in your eyes, and he says, 'Do not let Jonathan know this, lest he be grieved.' But truly, as Yehowah lives and as your soul lives, there is but a step between me and death."

Jonathan:

"Whatever you yourself desire, I will do it for you."

David:

"Indeed tomorrow is the New Moon, and I should not fail to sit with the king to eat. But let me go, that I may hide in the field until the third day at evening. If your father misses me at all, then say, 'David earnestly asked permission of me that he might run over to Bethlehem, his city, for there is a yearly sacrifice there for all the family. Narrator:

Jonathan:

Narrator:

Saul:

Jonathan:
