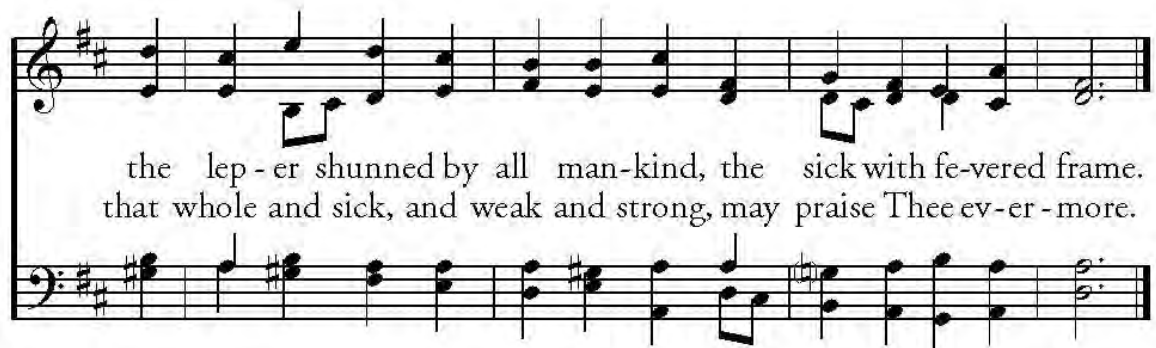
1. Thine arm, O Lord, in days of old, was strong to heal and save.
