Lesson 16: THE THREE HUNDRED PRIESTS Apocalypse Revealed 611

INTRODUCTION:

People who have died first live for a while in the world of spirits. Then, when they want to seek heaven, they look, and a path to follow appears. Good or bad people may want to look for heaven – good people because they want to be close to the Lord, and bad people because they think they deserve good treasures they might find there. The Lord doesn't stop anyone from seeking heaven. But not everyone who travels to heaven ends up feeling good when they get there. This story is based on something Swedenborg saw happen. Some boys in the world of spirits were watching, too.

READING:

"Brad and Mihn and the Three Hundred Priests" by Greg Henderson. This story is based on a story in *Apocalypse Revealed* 611. (This book is out of print, but the text of this story is attached at the end of this lesson.)

DISCUSSION:

These priests didn't want to stay in heaven because they felt awful there. Why did they feel awful? (Inside, these priests were evil, so they couldn't stand being in a place that was so full of goodness and love.)

In the spiritual world, people sometimes appear from a distance in some other form – something that represents what they are like. Why did the priests first appear like calves? (Because calves represent a love of learning and finding things out. These priests *did* love to learn and find out, but unfortunately it was not so they could help people with the knowledge. They wanted to learn in order to take advantage of other people.)

Why did they have such trouble breathing, and writhe on the ground like snakes? (The air there was of a heavenly atmosphere, and it choked them. They felt so tortured that they fell to the ground and writhed around like snakes.)

Why did they look like dead horses when they left the city? (A live horse represents a good, spiritual understanding of the Word. A dead horse represents a bad, merely worldly understanding of the Word.)

Notice how it was not the Lord or any angel that caused the priests to leave the heavenly city. The priests themselves desperately wanted to leave, and it was they who hurled themselves down the steep hill. That's how it is – everyone is invited by the Lord to come to heaven. But people who just don't love heavenly things – in fact, hate heavenly things – cannot handle the power of good, and feel tortured by it. So, by the Lord's mercy, they find another place to dwell, and that place is called hell.

But for all who want to have friendship, kindness, use, faith, and love as the most important things in life, a home will be waiting in heaven. This is the Lord's promise.

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PROJECT: Three Hundred Priests Memory Game

PREPARING THE THREE HUNDRED PRIESTS MEMORY GAME

A) Make *four* photocopies of the enclosed page, which shows the playing cards.

B) Color **2** cards of each of the following descriptions for the **standing** priests: 1) white robes and hats, red headbands and hanging cloths. 2) red robes and hats, white headbands and hanging cloths. 3) white robes and hats, orange headbands and hanging cloths. 4) orange robes and hats, white headbands and hanging cloths. 5) white robes and hats, yellow headbands and hanging cloths. 6) yellow robes and hats, white headbands and hanging cloths. 7) white robes and hats, green headbands and hanging cloths. 8) green robes and hats, white headbands and hanging cloths. 9) white robes and hats, blue headbands and hanging cloths. 10) blue robes and hats, white headbands and hanging cloths. 11) white robes and hats, purple headbands and hanging cloths. 12) purple robes and hats, white headbands and hanging cloths. 13) white robes and hats, brown headbands and hanging cloths. 14) brown robes and hats, white headbands and hanging cloths. 15) white robes and hats, black headbands and hanging cloths. 16) black robes and hats, white headbands and hanging cloths. 17) white robes and hats, gray headbands and hanging cloths. 18) gray robes and hats, white headbands and hanging cloths.

Color 2 cards for each of the following descriptions of slithering priests:

- 19) red robes and hats, white headbands and hanging cloths.
- 20) orange robes and hats, white headbands and hanging cloths.
- 21) yellow robes and hats, white headbands and hanging cloths.
- 22) green robes and hats, white headbands and hanging cloths.

Color 2 cards for each of the following:

- 23) Brown calves.
- 24) Black calves.
- 25) White calves with brown spots.
- 26) White calves with black spots.
- 27) Brown dead horses.
- 28) Gray dead horses.
- 29) Black, brown, and gray spotted dead horses.
- 30) Red or red-brown dead horses.
- C) Get some self-sticking contact paper with a dark pattern. Lay some down on a table and remove the peel-off paper, so that the contact paper is lying with the sticky side up. Now place the four sheets of paper you have colored face up onto the sticky contact paper, so the contact paper is sticking onto the *back* of the colored sheets.
- D) Cut the contact paper down to the size of the sheets of paper.

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- E) Get some clear, transparent contact paper. Lay it on the table and remove the peel-off paper so that the sticky side is up. Lay the sheets of paper *face down* onto the clear contact paper, so the contact paper is sticking onto the side that you colored.
- F) Cut the contact paper down to the size of the sheets of paper.
- G) Cut the individual cards apart. Now the memory game is ready to play!

PLAYING THE "THREE HUNDRED PRIESTS" MEMORY GAME


The three hundred priests need to get out of the heavenly city – they don't belong there! Shuffle the deck of cards and lay them out in six rows of ten on the table, face down.

Take turns turning over two cards. If they match, you can remove them. Those priests are out of the city! If they don't match, turn them back face down.

Everyone can try to help each other remember where the matches are.

There are three hundred priests in all. Some are standing. Some are slithering on the ground like snakes. Some look like calves, and some look like dead horses. See how long it takes to get them all out of the city!
